It's now almost two months since the devastating earthquake destroyed Port-au-Prince. So much has been happening that it is hard to keep up on it all.


In the meantime the news media have moved on to other stories and we're no longer saturated in details emanating from Haïti

One of the first things that impacted many watching the early television coverage was the singing that was heard in the camps on a night and on the streets during the day. Haïtian Christians brought prayer and worship to the heart of the devastation. What a testimony that has been!

Now gradually stories are beginning to emerge of a move of God amongst the rubble. It's human to exaggerate in these circumstances so EAC awaits full confirmation in the months ahead.

However, there are reports of large prayer meetings, of numerous commitments to Christ and of lives being transformed in the midst of death and destruction.

Christians globally must maintain the intercession on Haïti's behalf. Reconstruction will take years. If Haïti is to rebuild with new governmental structures and provide a new future for its citizens there needs to be divine wisdom and intervention.



We must also continue to give so that our brothers and sisters may rebuild their lives, homes, churches, hospitals, orphanages and a plethora of other ministries.

Haïtians neither helpless nor hopeless


Countless news reports have focused on the over-whelming worldwide response to the January 12 earthquake that shook Haïti. The continuing generous response of Christians around the globe will be necessary to help the Haïtian people rebuild their crumbled nation, but make no mistake: They are not hopeless, and they are not

helpless.

Tens of thousands of people died in the quake, and close to a million people are without homes. Thousands of Christians in Haïti have been affected. Still, many congregations are using volunteers from within to distribute food, water, blankets and crisis care kits to those with the greatest needs in their communities.

Right now, in tent cities and church distribution centres all over the capital city, Carrefour, and surrounding areas church members are passing these lifelines to Haitian brothers and sisters.

In the midst of such great need, simple acts of Christlike compassion are having a great and immediate impact.







Imprisoned Cuban Pastor's Appeal Denied

HAVANA, CUBA (ANS) -

- A Cuban Evangelical Pastor has been denied the right to appeal his sixyear prison sentence by the Supreme Tribunal in Hayana.


Christian Solidarity
Worldwide (CSW) reports
that Pastor Omar Gude
Perez, a leader in a fast
growing network of independent churches called
the 'Apostolic Reformation', was convicted of
"falsification of documents" after trumped up
charges were made

against him during a summary trial last July. In a statement to Christian Solidarity Worldwide (CSW) Pastor Gude Perez's wife said the court's decision confirmed her belief that her husband's arrest and imprisonment in May 2008 was orchestrated at the highest levels of government.

CSW says that Pastor Gude Perez was initially charged with human trafficking, but a local court threw out the charges ten months later citing a total lack of evidence. The latest charge was brought against him a full year after his initial detention. The prosecution's petition also accused the pastor of "counter-revolutionary conduct and attitudes."

CSW also reports that another key pastor in the Apostolic Reformation Network is currently contesting government efforts to evict him from his home and confiscate his property.

The winners of the awards were determined by a panel of 80 artistes and industry professionals which included Tom Waits, The Black Keys, Ricky Skaggs, Pete Wentz, Mark Hoppus, Aimee Mann, The Apples in Stereo, David Garrett, Suzanne Vega, Bettye LaVette, Judy Collins, Zooey Deschanel, and M. Ward.

The IMA's are one of the most influential awards for independent bands and fans. According to Martin Folkman, the executive director of the awards, "The awards celebrate artists who follow their own muse and the true music fans who support them." He adds, "The artists who've been honored by the IMAs create some of the best music you may ever have heard."



EAC-CYNET Addresses "Sex in the Church"

EAC's Caribbean Youth Network (EAC-CYNET), in cooperation with the Guyana Evangelical Fellowship's youth arm, has begun a series of church programmes entitled "Sex in the Church."

According to Pastor Eworth Williams, Executive Director of EAC-CYNET, "For too long talking about sex in the church has been a 'no no'. As a result we are seeing an upsurge in sexual immorality, morals are slowly decaying and church continues to be 'church'. We felt that it is time to address young people in the church and, most importantly, their parents."

The programme, which is run Sunday afternoon in participating churches in Guyana, informs parents about issues affecting their children and grandchildren and seeks to provide solutions to

questions and issues raised by the youth. Professional peer educators, counsellors and real life testimonies from the youth themselves are all part of the programme presented.

Pointing to the Survey of Sexual Practices' finding that more than 2% of youth attending Evangelical churches have tested positive for HIV, Pastor Williams says, "It's time to get up and speak."

St. Vincent Reacts to Sexual Practices Survey

The results of the sex survey have been disseminated throughout St. Vincent and especially the Christian community. Following the discussion of the results that Bishop Gerry Seale lead with that group at the Glen Baptist Church, various aspects of the results of the survey were included, and discussed, by Rev. George Fredricks and Rev. Noel Clarke on their nationally televised programme "Encounter". This peaked interest amongst many in the Christian community. Dr. Jules Ferdinand then wrote extensively on the results in his weekly newspaper column in the "Vincentian" newspaper. I had the opportunity of discussing further the survey and its impact and possibilities on Youth

For Christ's radio programme held on Saturday mornings and the televised programme of Hope For Life Restoration Ministries. On that programme I sat on a panel with three young ladies from the church's youth executive along with host, Ms. Pearlette Williams. Added to these, I have been sharing the survey results with churches, youth groups, health officials, individuals, service groups, schools and Christian leaders throughout the island face-to-face and through other communication mediums.

At this point the impact of the survey has been that:

 Information never before collated and tabulated has been made accessible to key national church leaders and their congrega-

- tions influencing decisions and programme formula-
- The Association of Evangelical Churches will be embarking on a series of targeted discussions and forums on the result of the survey.
- Churches have been using the results as the basis for a greater emphasis on sex, sexuality and HIV/AIDS.
- ◆ The issue of sex as it pertains to the church and churched is no longer in the closet, national platforms have been used to discuss the subject.
- Youth in churches are speaking out and to their friends about sex.
 I foresee future and indirect impact to be:

- Open discussions about HIV/AIDS, sex and sexuality.
- Projects that focus on such topics.
- Increase in healthy sexual practices as a result of the concentrated spotlight placed on the matter.
- Future surveys.
- Involvement of cross sectoral agencies in the programmes of the church (Gender Affairs, Health Unit, etc.).
- Parents, teachers and youth leaders aware, informed and thus equipped to be a part of the solution.
